These female characters in movies undergo transformations that reflect their evolving values and status in society.

Female characters were viewed as the embodiment of sin and the source of dread in early 20th-century science fiction movies:
For instance, female characters were all portrayed as wicked in Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde (1931), The Bride of Frankenstein (1935), and Frankenstein (1910). In the former, a bride was spliced by a scientist and turned into a zombie; in the latter, a debauched woman mirrored the violent nature of the main character. In the western world, liberal feminism was in vogue during this time. Women went to battle to defend their legal and political rights. In actuality,

their efforts led to the creation of numerous legislation that safeguards women's rights. Hollywood movies had grown at the turn of the 20th century, and the action-packed, exciting movies had taken over. These shifts from the early style of dread to adventure stories are also seen in science fiction. The partners of the male characters in these tales were however women. They show up with male characters as a housewife or a lover.

The first Star Wars movie was released in 1977, and Leia Organa Solo, a stunning woman, made a lasting impression on many viewers. Princess Leia plays the role of a goddess in this movie. She no longer has her own unique story significance since she has been reduced to a power symbol in the bilateral struggle for wars as a lovely "prize".

In 2015, Mad Max: Fury Road film was released and the subject of this film, Charlize Theron, called "Fury Road" a "amazing feminist movie." She addressed the unfair portrayal of women in movies by claiming that actors play "either a really nice mother, or a pretty excellent hooker", implying that the "Madonna/whore complex" still affects how women are portrayed in movies. In other words, women are unable to play as many different roles as males do. Theron has also discussed the

More realistic characters that are no longer the acolytes of male characters are demanded by audiences. Movies and reality inextricably linked; viewers can see mappings of actual events and social issue criticisms in movies and other works of art. In a same vein, movies will influence reality and usher in a fresh school of thought.
