Such emphasis on methodological rigor is vital to ensure that conclusions reached from publications contained in the journal are valid and reliable. Peer review remains a vital component of our assessment of submitted articles. There have been criticisms of this process, including delaying publication, unreliability of decision making, overly conservative approach automatically rejecting 'non-standard' ideas, and that peer review is poor at detecting errors and misconduct. However, these weaknesses can be managed by an effective and active editorial office, and I believe they are outweighed by the benefits. There is strong consensus that accepted articles are often improved by peer review after referees' comments and criticisms are dealt with; this explicit appraisal process also helps to engender trust of the reader.

It is important that we have a good balance of different article type within the journal. We are keen to encourage publication of high-quality evidence-based guidelines, such articles are widely read (and downloaded), can have major impact on different educational practices, and also tend to be highly cited. The journal also has the potential to (re-) shape thinking on important concepts in educational research, and here 'new horizons' articles have a particular role.

I would like to thanks to authors who have chosen Edumania as the journal for publication of their scholarly research work. On behalf of editorial team, I assure each one to continue excelling in quality research and publication.
